#### 2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

- IQAC carried out the documentation of the various programmes/activities of the college.
- The academic calendar is annually prepared by the IQAC and it monitors its implementation throughout the year.
- IQAC arranges feedback responses from different stakeholders such as students, alumni, parents etc. on quality related institutional processes.
- It acts as a nodal agency for co-ordinating quality related activities.
- It identifies the best practices and disseminating them among the students and teachers.
- It organises workshops and seminars on quality related theme. Two workshops have been organised by IQAC during this session i) Use of modern tool in teaching-learning ii) Research paper writing
- It disseminates information among the students and teachers on the various quality parameters of higher education
- It works towards facilitating the creation of a learner-centric environment conducive for quality education
- IQAC prepares AQAR for the college for assessment and re-accreditation by NAAC
- IQAC urged the authority to set up a smart class room to facilitate interactive teachinglearning.
- It is actively involved in promoting research activities in the college. It co-ordinates with the Research Committee in examining and evaluating the research proposals of the faculty members before submitting to the agencies like UGC, ICSSR etc. Two MRP proposals have been accepted by the UGC during the session 2013-14. The Committee also involved in preparing the proposals for organising National Seminars and Workshops in the colleges with the financial assistance from UGC. UGC during this session. The workshop was held on May 9 - 10, 2014 and the seminar will be held during August 29 - 30, 2014.

- The IQAC in association with the Health Care Cell of organizes health check-up and health awareness programmes. Health awareness and check-up camps such as a breast cancer awareness programme was organised on 24<sup>th</sup> Oct, 2013 for the girl students on the occasion of international breast cancer day where experts from Dr. B. Barooah Cancer Institute participated as resource persons; free dental check up was organised on 8<sup>th</sup> March, 2014 in association with Regional Dental College, Guwahati; a free health camp on fitness was organised on 12<sup>th</sup> may, 2014 with the initiative of Kotak Mahindra Bank and VLCC were organised.
- The IQAC in association with Students' Welfare Committee of the college works for the welfare of the students. It selects poor meritorious students for providing financial help by the authority in the form of book grants, free uniform, waiver of tuition fees etc. A two day workshop was also organized by the committee on 24<sup>th</sup> & 25<sup>th</sup> June, 2014 on "Sahaja Yoga aaj ka Maha Yoga" for the students & teachers.
- The Women's Cell in collaboration with the IQAC works towards providing a gender friendly atmosphere in the college. On 24<sup>th</sup> January, 2014 the cell observed National Day for the Girl Child where experts from the civil society participated.
- The IQAC in association with the Beautification Cell makes efforts to keep the campus clean, green and eco-friendly.

3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

As a part of institutional social responsibility, the college in association with NGO's, AIDS Control Society etc. is providing various community services in the form of extension activities:

- A one week camp was organised at Bhabanipur village, Noonmati from November 3 − 8, 2013 to provide various community services. In the camp about 50 NSS volunteers of our college were actively involved in repairing of dilapidated roads, drains, toilets of the village L.P.School. Besides, tree plantation, door to door survey, awareness programme on sanitation, environment etc. were conducted by the students of the college with the help of local NGOs.
- On the occasion of one month celebration of National Youth Day during January 12 February 10, 2014, our college along with the 62 colleges of the Kamrup (Metro) participated in the Students-Teachers-Public mega rally and mega blood donation camp; health check-up and AIDS awareness programme, organised in association with State AIDS Control Society. A total of 60 students were participated in the mega blood donation camp on February 5, 2014, health check-up and AIDS awareness programme on February 10, 2014.
- A talk was delivered by two members of the extension education cell on voting behavior and political consciousness among the new voters on 4<sup>th</sup> April, 2014 at Narangi Anchalik College, Guwahati.

- "CONVERSATION"- a functional Assamese class for non Assamese students belonging specially to the various tribal communities of North East has been organising by the extension education cell since 20<sup>th</sup> May 2014 and continues till date.
- The extension education cell has been organising an adult literacy programme "SAATHI" in Patharkuchi area of greater Guwahati to educate specially the domestic help worker of the locality since 5<sup>th</sup> June, 2014 and continues till date.
- The cell organises a moral and spiritual talk on "Day to day life on Bhagavad Gita" on 16<sup>th</sup> June, 2014 at R.J College Survey, Guwahati. The talk was delivered by the members from ISKCON, Guwahati.
- Members of the cell are also associated with Vivekananda Kendra which conducts various programmes on personality development, yoga, meditation etc.
- Some members of the cell are associated with the ART OF LIVING which conducts similar community service programmes.
- Members of the cell are also associated with an NGO called HERD which takes care of the health of the needy people from rural areas. Free cataract operation, camp free BMI test, blood donations are some of the activities of the NGO.
- A member of the cell is an active member of PRERANA- IAS officers' wives' association which is a registered body under the Societies Registration Act, 1860. The member is associated with welfare activities like providing relief fund during disasters (flood, riots etc), sponsoring two girl students of SISHU SARATHI a spastic society and providing infrastructural facilities to the LEPROSY REHABILITATION CENTER at Chirang district, Assam.
- The faculty members of the college have contributed fund for the management of AMAR GHAR (an old age home), ASHADEEP (home for destitute women) and KARUNADHARA (a society for the physically challenge).
- Another member of the cell has acted as resource person in two personality development camps organized by Vivekananda Kendra on 1<sup>st</sup> July, 2013 and Assam Jatiya Vidyalay, Guwahati from 6<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup> July, 2013.
- A college faculty is an active member of NATARAJ, a socio-cultural society (Registered NGO) which is associated with SOS children village, Azara and B. Barooah Cancer Institute, Guwahati. As member of the society she has organized workshops on vocal and awareness programmes on Cancer. She has also participated in cleaning of streets and drains on 8<sup>th</sup> Nov, 2013 organised by Chilarai Nagar Mahila Samity. She has also participated on spiritual programme organized by the said Mahila samitya.
- Seven faculties of the college acted as master trainers for training polling officers during the general election 2014 and also one faculty acted as Presiding officer.
- Many faculty members of the college have donated old clothes, medicines, old furniture etc to the poor and needy.

## Proposed plan of the extension education cell during the session 2014-15

- To provide physical training to the students of nearby schools by trained physical instructors.
- To arrange crash course for 21 days on the prescribed syllabus mainly for H.S students of nearby Higher Secondary School, Ulubari.
- To inculcate the spirit of nationalism and patriotism among the young generation through a seven days course on brief history and culture of India.

- To provide value based education and to inculcate the principles of morality, devotion, duty, and responsibility among the students.

#### 6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

The college does not have a Management Information System (MIS). We have a plan to develop a MIS in the 2014-15 academic sessions in future so that all kinds of information can be accessed and retrieved readily and instantly so as to provide better services to the stakeholders and also to bring transparency in the administration.

## 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

## 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The curriculum of BA/ B.Com is prescribed by the university which is followed by the affiliated colleges. However, members of the teaching staff of the college are involved in curriculum restructuring/ revision/ syllabus development at the university level. Curriculum development workshops organised by the university and other colleges are attended regularly and suggestions are given whenever necessary. The college also has some add- on courses in computer. The computer classes are held within the normal college hours and are included in the class routine. Some of the computer courses offered by the college are Tally Erp9, DBMS, DTP, Web design, MS Dos/ Windows, MS office, computer language- C/C++ etc.

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning:

- The College has adopted many innovative processes for the improvement of teaching and learning.
- Group discussion, seminars, course related quiz, surprise test etc are held round the year so that there is active involvement of the students in the teaching learning process.
- Remedial classes are also held towards the end of each session to help the academically weak students.
- \* Reading list, lecture summary, study materials and home assignments are also given to the students for their comprehensive learning. Students are given help and training in the use of library and computer services and are informed about the availability of reading materials and e-resources for the prescribed syllabus in the library.
- ❖ Talks by scholars and renowned personalities are arranged to motivate students to achieve higher goals.

❖ The college encourages and sanctions leave to its staff to attend orientation programmes, Refresher Courses and short term courses so that they can update their domain knowledge and also get acquainted with the latest developments and teaching methods.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation:

The college holds sessional and final examinations as per University guidelines. Quality improvement measures are adopted from time to time for the smooth running of the examination. Examination committees are formed which organises the examination and strategies are adopted like allotment of examination duties, proper invigilation, confidential handling of question paper etc. The evaluation process is also conducted in an organised manner. Spot evaluations of final examination are done by the faculty members in examination zones fixed by the University. In the sessional examinations, there is in- house evaluation which is completed within a stipulated time and the marks are displayed in the notice board.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

- Research Committee of the college formulates the strategies for Research and Development of the College.
- The College urges its faculty members to apply for Minor and Major Research Projects from funding agencies.
- As part of the strategy the College has organised a UGC sponsored workshop on "Research Project Writing" on May 9-10, 2014, to enlighten the participants on Research Project proposal writing. A UGC sponsored National seminar will be held on August 29-30, 2014 on" Environment and Civil Society: Issues, Problems and Remedies."
- As a result of constant encouragement by the college, more than 50 percent of permanent faculty has completed PhD and few others are pursuing. One faculty member submitted her PhD thesis availing UGC's FDP.
- The college urges the faculty members to present at least two research papers in seminars and conferences and publish the papers in peer reviewed journals.
- The college has received 10 ISBN and will be publishing books shortly. The first two volumes with ISBN will be the Proceeding Volumes of the UGC sponsored workshop and seminar.

 As part of our effort of encouraging research and development the college library has 8 numbers of journals catering to different subjects and numerous e-journals. The College library also regularly procures reference books for the faculty.

#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- New books are displayed in the book case near the entrance of the stack area to motivate our student and staff to read new arrivals.

#### ICT and physical infrastructure

- College library is functioning through LAN
- Wi-fi internet access facility is available in the library and Principle's chamber.
- The college campus is under CCTV surveillance.
- Laptops, projectors, display screens are procured to make the seminar, workshop as well as class room presentation lively and interactive
- Computer Lab of 10 No.s of computers with internet facility is available for providing basic computer training to the newly admitted students.
- Two biometric devices are strictly maintained for ensuring effective presence of both teaching and non-teaching staff in the college;
- College administration is partially automated. The staff is being given training on various aspects of automation and office management.

## 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Various positions in teaching faculty are filled up on the basis of merit only.

- All the departments are provided separate rooms so that the faculty members can prepare well for their classes.
- As part of our effort of encouraging research and development the college library has 8 numbers of journals catering to different subjects and numerous e-journals. The College library also regularly procures reference books for the faculty.
- CCTV is installed at various locations in the college for security purposes which also helps in human resource management.

#### 6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

All faculty positions are filled as per norms laid down by the University/state government. Eligible candidates are shortlisted on basis of UGC guidelines and invited for interview. Candidates are selected on the basis of their merits, research experience and their performance in personal interview taken by an interview panel. The college has the required number of staffs to handle the courses and no appointments of permanent faculty have been made since 2008. However, contractual and part time teachers are appointed as and when required by a committee consisting of the Principal, Vice-Principal and the HoD concerned through personal interview. The selection is based on merit, research and experience. Computer literacy of the newly recruited staff is also considered as desirable.

## 6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The college is named after a noted industrialist of the state whose family donated the main college building. The college also interacts with the industry as and when required. Various commercial and industrial organisations provide sponsorship in various college programmes like seminar, workshop, lecture, silver jubilee celebration etc.

#### 6.3.9 Admission of Students

The process of admitting students to the programmes offered by the college is by a transparent, well administered mechanism, complying with all the norms of the concerned regulatory/governing agencies including state government. The following steps are followed in admission procedure to ensure publicity and transparency-

- Advertisements are published in local dailies (both Assamese and English) wherein all relevant dates are mentioned.
- Complete details are also placed on the college websites to felicitate online access to the requisite information about the college admission procedure.
- Prospectus and forms are collected from the college office by the candidates on payments.
   While the prospectus contains all the details of the admission procedure, the bio-data and academic records of the students are to be given in the form
- The submitted forms are sorted by the admission committee headed by the Principal and a

merit list is prepared. The merit list is displayed on the college notice board a day before the admission. Complete transparency is ensured on the day of the admission as candidates are admitted on the basis of the merit list.



- 7) Coaching, counselling, guidance and placement assistance being provided by a Cell designated for the purpose.
- 8) Financial assistance being provided to the needy students under the students' welfare scheme.

- 19) Lack of value added courses.
- 20) Lack of sufficient medical facility in case of emergency
